MAKE YOUR LIFE A MASTERPIECE **RABBI MICHAEL GOTLIEB**

This article appeared in the Jewish Journal on June 12, 2015.

Having recently attended the college graduation of our youngest child, I could not stop thinking about what I might say if given the opportunity to offer the commencement address. Five thoughts come to mind:

Continue to learn and teach: At the moment you were born — whether conscious of it or not — all of you have been students. All of you were constantly learning from others, patterning and comparing yourselves to the world around gloat over your degree or your school's vou.

At the same time, you have always been teachers. Beginning with infancy, you taught your parents and family about the preciousness of life and the awe-inspiring responsibility of raising a child simply by your being born. You've taught them about themselves, as they observed and raised you.

As you leave the womb that is the college environment, all of you become teachers. If not literal credentialed teachers, figuratively so. You are now college graduates. Teach and share what you've learned over the past four years. Don't namesake.

Develop and maintain a humble soul: All of you feel a great sense of accomplishment; you've worked hard. But it's expected that you worked hard and made sacrifices while in college. College is not summer camp. If anything, being in college is a supreme gift. Metaphorically, all of you stand on the shoulders of the generations that have come before you. All of you have benefited from those who built and maintained your school.

By now you should also know some students wishing to attend particular schools have been turned down for

FROM THE RITUAL COMMITTEE

The Etz Chaim synagogue in Chania, Crete is tucked away on a dead-end alley off a secondary street up from the town's port. The other synagogue was destroyed in the war, and, while Etz Etz Chaim is a small, eclectic community. Crete is an insular place, Chaim was trashed, it survived. In 1994, Nico Stavroulakis, the founder of the Jewish Museum of Athens, moved to Chania and, with his own resources and little information, began refurbishing the synagogue.

The fixtures were long gone, but, left on the walls after 50 years of neglect, was the outline of the principal pieces. On the eastern The place is a local attraction, listed on the tourist maps, and wall, the Ark; on the western, in local Greek-Romaniot style, was last year received over 26,000 visitors. One morning, before the

a raised, covered bima, with seats for the community notables. In the middle stood the cantor's table. The men sat on benches lining the north and south walls; the women's section was upstairs, behind a lattice.
