

## **PASSOVER MEMORIES**

Why is Passover so popular? Why does it continue to generate greater interest and participation than all other Jewish holidays, including Hanukkah, Purim, Shabbat and Yom Kippur? Even among disaffected and estranged Jews its popularity soars. More versions of the Passover Haggadah have been written than any other Jewish work. That includes commentary on the Hebrew Bible, rabbinic texts and the prayer book.

One reason is Passover takes place around a table, typically in a home,

not a synagogue. The power of ritual that fit their needs. Come to most observance tied to an ornate group dinner cannot be underestimated.

Another reason for Passover's ongoing popularity is the holiday encourages personal creativity. Perhaps it's a song that is chanted, or the way the table is decorated, or a narrative acted out by its participants? No matter, the Passover Seder is engaging and lends itself to creative, fun-filled innovation.

Not uncommonly, families and individuals craft their own Passover Haggadot; they form their own customs and establish guidelines

synagogues, the liturgical sections of the service, while it may change periodically, are largely fixed and often passive.

Yet another reason Passover remains so popular is its universal message: Physical liberation, freedom from slavery. As the Bible recounts, we Jews were slaves in Egypt, and with God's intervention, were freed. What's more, the Biblically based principle of freedom, applies to all humanity, not just to the Jews. While the classic Haggadah is filled with allegory,

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history and nuanced thought, the main idea behind Passover is not complex.

But there's one more reason to help explain Passover's un-equaled popularity. More than anything: Passover generates memories.

We can philosophize about our religious tradition all we want. We can pick it apart and offer new insights into its biblical and rabbinic literatures—all of which are important and definitional to what it means to be actively engaged in our religion.

Nonetheless, without memories; warm, inspiring, heart filled memories; Judaism is nothing more than a cerebral

exercise. Nothing more than intellectual jockeying, trying to prove a point, or pose a better question.

If for nothing else, Passover is a divinely prescribed dinner made for us to fashion memories. It takes place around the modern equivalent of the ancient Temple's altar, one's table. To truly fulfill the Passover rite, it must be a table filled with laughter and tears, spiritual insight, warmth, love and Godliness.

So, as you gather in observance of Passover, create lasting memories. Be moved as you reminisce over Passovers' gone by. Seated around your table, share and experience the beauty of being Jewish. Above all, do what it takes to insure your Passover Seder engenders life-long, inspirational memories.

Which causes one to think..., We Jews have so much about which we can and should be proud. Whether it is something like JWW's walk, how Israel is always among the first responders to natural and health disasters around the world, or the countless efforts by countless other Jewish-based organizations, we have a rich and ongoing tradition of reaching out to help people far beyond our own (tiny) community, of making a real difference in the world. We do it without fanfare, because it is part of our culture, part of what makes us Jews. By just about any measure one can think of, there is no other tradition that has made contributions to the world that is so disproportionately large compared to its size.

At the same time, and with bitter irony, we must be aware of the very real strain of, and growth in, anti-Semitism in the world, including here at home. While sometimes cloaked as anti-Israel sentiment, that is a distinction without a difference. To take just one recent example, an Oberlin College professor has written that Jews, including Mossad, were behind the 9/11 attacks here and the Charlie Hebdo attacks in France, and others defend her comments as real scholarship and academic freedom. http://www.nytimes.com/2016/03/08/us/ oberlin-leaders-denounce-professors-remarks-as-antisemitic.html?\_r=0

We must not be paranoid about this but we cannot turn a blind eye to it. We must recognize that there is no other demographic about which such libels would be defended – by anybody – as "scholarship" or "academic freedom." We must point out to the world and defend ourselves against those that spread such vicious blood libels as we continue to sponsor, do and take pride in the good work that our heritage fosters and supports.

The year is flying by.... We had our sixth Ohr L'Olam Mitzvah program this past month partnering with Friendship Circle. Gail Rollman our guest facilitator from Friendship Circle led our students in interactive activities.

including simulation activities so that our students could better learn and appreciate the work that Friendship Circle does for kids with Special Needs in the Jewish community. Our learning Mitzvot centered around – Love your Neighbor as Yourself, Created in the Image of God, and Clinging to Friendship. Our program concluded with our students making masks for Purim, writing cards and packing and sending Mishloach Manot to our new friends at Friendship Circle in time for their Purim party. Our next Ohr L'Olam Program will be on Sunday, April 17th where we join the greater community and walk to end Genocide with JWW. Prior to the walk are school will be engrossed in learning activities getting us ready for the walk. This will be another amazing community-wide experience. Stay tuned for more info!

This past month our Religious School celebrated Purim with a school-wide Purim "Good Morning Shushan" "Boker Tov Shushan" Talk Show starring the entire Purim Cast (teachers in costumes) for an informational Q&A for each of the Purim characters which helped to underline the true relevance of the Purim story, each characters role and what they stood for, and the main lessons we learn from Purim. Following Boker Tov Shushan, our students rotated to three stations: Baking Hamentashen, weaving and packing Mishloach Manot baskets, and learning the Mitzvot and main values of Purim and their relevance today. Our school also cancelled Tuesday Religious School encouraging our students to attend our big Purim Disco extravaganza on Wednesday in lieu of Tuesday Religious School. I am excited to report that our school continues to grow...We now have 13 teens enrolled in our new High School program. For our second teen night, we invited in an IDF team of three to explain the IDF and their positions and experiences while serving in the IDF, and how they were all trained utilizing Krav Maga. We also invited in an expert Krav Maga team from Krav Maga Worldwide, where our students participated in an hour long Krav Maga class, learning both verbal and physical techniques, including self defense, anti-bullying and self empowerment. Finally, the American Security team from Omega Securities, who receives most of their intelligence from Israel, taught our teens how to apply day to day life skills and safety tips for High School and beyond.

Our next High School event will be on Sunday, April 10th. Our students will meet at the Santa Monica Playhouse to view New Eyes, an acclaimed one woman show starring our very own, Yafit Josephson. Parents are invited to join us. Following the show we will take our teens out for dinner on the 3rd Street Promenade. Stay tuned for next month's article, pictures and more.

On a personal note, I attended the AIPAC Policy Conference which marks my 9th time attending. I am excited to report that my sister who lives in Florida and my parents who live in Asheville North Carolina joined me for the Policy Conference. It was so cool to share this experience with my KM community as well as my family. Each year I come back from AIPAC even more charged with advocating for Israel and excited to share that impact and enthusiasm for Israel with our Religious School and now High School students. I plan to bring in AIPAC facilitators as a follow-up from the Conference for our High School students.

# FROM THE RITUAL COMMITTEE

Amazon lists over 2300 different haggadot, and another 76 for its kindle. The Library of Congress has 2597 entries of haggadah. Perhaps this an unnecessary demonstration; we all know that there is vast number and variety of haggadot. Political seders, spiritual seders, atheistic seders (really, and it's 8 pages!); the 30 minute seder (even a two minute seder: just the basics, please, pass the horseradish), environmentalist seder, all of top of our panopoly of denominational and post-denominational haggadot (New Age, Old Age, Renewal, Reform, Conservative, LGBTQ, Diverse, Open Orthodox, Modern Orthodox, Traditional, Sephardi, Mizrachi, Charedi, Zionist, anti-Zionist, post-Zionist, gluten free and guilt-ridden).

The variety is staggering, and, overwhelmed, most of us might default to Maxwell House. or whatever might be sitting around the house, awaiting another wine drenching as we impatiently work our way through obscure language and arcane ritual.

The trick, the problem, is how to make our most ancient ritual speak to modern sensibilities. Thus the plethora of haggadot, fitted out to every variety of interest and inclination.

There are, perhaps, two principle reasons that the ritual is difficult to grasp without some "specialized" training, so to speak. First, our modern Jewish identity is very complex. In the past 200-250 years, we Jews have tried on many different colored identity coats: the exclusively religious-spiritual (for example the 19th century reforming "Germans of the Mosaic Faith"); the strictly national, secularist early 20th century Zionists, or the Eastern European Yiddishists; the "familial-traditional" Jews, unconcerned with ideological matters, but who gravitated to familiar and familial surroundings, almost simply as a matter of comfort. Along the way, many modern Jews have come to relish a peculiar ancient-modern combination of identity: a religious base, some national ingredients, familial spices all mixed into our identity cholent.

Then how do we choose a Haggadah that works on Pesach, that gives us enough rope to fulfill our own sense of the ritual minimums, and enough license that we can enjoy getting stewed at the Pesach table?

The secret ingredient for a good Pesach table is not the food, nor the books, but the company, and the talk. Most traditional haggadot note that one is greatly praised for extensive discussion of the miracle of Pesach. It might not be our inclination to repeat endless antique *midrashim* praising God's might; but, on the other hand, on that night, there is a real miracle in the celebration. After thousands of years, across the global, in new circumstances, we continue to recall that miracle then, which is our miracle now. And talking about that is worthwhile in its own right.

Judy and Ness had gathered their entire extended family to meet and greet the KM guests. Old KM friends and brand-new KM acquaintances broke bread together in the family dining room. Good fellowship made us hungry, and the delicious potluck meal quickly vanished. At dessert time, we munched on blood oranges and other freshly-picked fruit from Ness's own orchard.

As marvelous as the food and the surroundings were, they were eclipsed by Ness's stories of leaving Egypt as a young man, then slowly making his way across the world to Southern California. With Passover approaching, we were all grateful for this reminder that some of our ancestors had not left Egypt along with Moses. Ness's explanation: his family back then had no alarm clock, and so they missed the Exodus.
