I OO BLESSINGS A DAY RABBI MICHAEL GOTLIEB

In the 10th chapter, 12th verse of Deuteronomy, an important, age-old question is raised and with it, an answer offered: "And now, O Israel, what does the Lord your God demand of you? Only this: to revere the Lord your God, to walk only in His paths, to love Him, and to serve the Lord your God with all your heart and soul."

The Talmud cites Rabbi Meir commenting on the verse saying, "We are obligated to offer 100 blessings daily." Why does he say we should offer 100 blessings a day? His interpretation of the text plays with the Hebrew word "Mah", which translates as "what." He claims the word "Mah" is similar to another Hebrew word, "Meah" meaning 100. Hence: What does God want of us?

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God wants us to recite 100 blessings a day. Meir lived in the 2nd/early 3rd century. His popularity is due in part to his exceptional wife, Bruriah. She is one of only a few women mentioned by name in the Talmud (Menachot 43b).

Nearly 2,000 years after Rabbi Meir's rather imaginative interpretation comes along the twentieth century theologian, Max Kadushin. Basing his insight, in part, on Rabbi Meir's free-flowing interpretation, Kadushin coins the phrase "normal mysticism."

To Kadushin's way of thinking, normal mysticism is the ability—an ability all of us can develop or hone—to see the

limitless blessings found in the everyday. The normal mystic trains him/herself to see blessings in the mundane. The normal mystic links all of his or her daily experiences to the divine. For the normal mystic, the issue isn't the precise number of blessings, rather it's the ability to offer and see blessings period, whether in good times or in bad.

With Kadushin's 20th century application of Rabbi Meir's 3rd century whimsical interpretation, we have at our disposal yet another angle of understanding to the vitally important question: "...What does the Lord your God demand of you?" In light of these thinkers, we fulfill God's request as stated in the Torah by heightening our

appreciation for the gift of our everyday lives. (Blessings are not for God's benefit. We're not commanded to bless God per-se, telling Him how great, wonderful and powerful He is. The Creator of the cosmos is not insecure. Blessings are for our benefit.)

Many of us continually search for and live by the stellar moments in life, those "mountaintop highs." Many of us are metaphoric conquerors relentlessly setting out for yet another conquest whether in property or person.

What Rabbi Meir and Max Kadushin are teaching us in stereophonic clarity is to open our eyes and simply look. They are providing us with a valuable lesson on how to live life and ultimately fulfill one of God's requests by having us consider the value that can be had by living life at "sea level."

Blessings abound, not just 100 blessings, but countless blessings. Yes, say a blessing for those everyday moments that typically come and go without much notice. Interpret them, and take note of them. What an exceptional idea to offer a blessing, and with it, voice a word of appreciation for the constancies that make up our lives. Sounds like timeless, sage advice to me.



A MOON UNTO OTHERS

"We need to use both sight and sound to reflect the light of God"

We just celebrated the festival of Passover, and this year there was also a complete lunar eclipse. It was around midnight when it happened, just after I had finished the first night Seder. I went outside, gazed up to the heavens, and watched in awe as the moon slowly began to disappear until it was fully eclipsed and turned red. The

earth was in the path between the moon and the sun's light.

The sun is a metaphor for God being the source of light for us, the Jewish people. The sun shines upon the moon and the moon reflects its light. As Jewish people, we have connections with the moon because we follow the lunar calendar. We are also like the moon in that we reflect the light of God, the sun, with guidance from the Torah.

The festival of Shavuot is when the Jewish people received the Torah, and it is then that the reason for the freedom we were granted on Passover becomes clear. Our mission is to spread the light of God to the world by being an example and a light onto the nations of the world through the Torah.

When God gave us the Torah, it was accompanied with two things: a strong voice and a great light. Music and light are two wonderful tools for celebration. The special offering for the festival of Shavuot, the bikkurim (the first fruit) was accompanied by a specific verse sung by the community. Throughout our rich history, the development of music has been a cornerstone in serving God and in communal and family life. So why did I find this Pesach eclipse so profound? The moon went dark because the earth was blocking it, preventing the moon from reflecting the light of the sun. So too, there are times when we can get in our own way and end up not reflecting the light of God unto others—in a way, not being able to be a moon unto others. I thought about this and wondered how we can prevent ourselves from getting in our own way. For me, it's through music—I'll listen to a childhood record, sing, or do something else involving music.

Light and music are the equivalent of sight and hearing. Music has the ability to create different settings, illusions, and emotions without the need for light. Indeed, the experience of listening to music is often heightened when one's eyes are closed. Conversely, one's eyes need to be open to see light and the light itself can be greatly enhanced when combined with music. For example, firework shows are often accompanied by music. Going very fast can break the speed of sound and even light can be "broken" if the source of the light is blocked out. Sometimes it is necessary to slow the tempo down and trace the light back to its source.

We received the Torah through both music and light, and I don't believe this combination to be a coincidence. If we are to use the Torah as a guide in our lives, we need to use both sight and sound in order to reflect the light of God, in order to be a moon unto others.

This is also why the power of music on a communal level is even more profound. It can help us, together as one, trace our steps back to the original source of Mount Sinai where we, the Jewish people, received the Torah. The Torah is a guide that can help bring the source of light and music, sight and sound into the world, thus creating an unbroken connection to God.

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BRANDEIS' SHAME

Many of you are aware of Brandeis University's shameful act of cancelling the commencement address by Ayaan Hirsi Ali and withdrawing the honorary degree that they had intended to grant her. What makes this act shameful is what this woman stands for and what Brandeis no longer seems to. Ali was born in Mogadishu, Somalia, and raised under strict Sharia law. Like many women raised under radical Islam, she was genitally mutilated. Through her life in Somalia, she was subjected to the severities of radical Islamic law. In 1992, she escaped

to the Netherlands to avoid an impending arranged marriage to a relative. She learned the Dutch language and established a new life, rising to become a member of the Dutch parliament, where she worked to further the integration of non-Western immigrants into Dutch society. She railed against the harshness and injustices of life under Sharia law, under which she has

been condemned as being anti-Islam. Ms. Ali has spoken out against genital mutilation of 8 year-old girls, children being forced into polygamous marriages with men old enough to be their grandfathers, face-veiling of women, and honor killings of women who have been raped, left abusive marriages, or dared to express an independent opinion, to name a few things. As a result of her efforts, she has lived under constant threat of death.

Brandeis claimed that they hadn't vetted Ms. Ali carefully enough, and after further examination concluded that she didn't deserve the award because of her condemnation of Islam as a whole.

While she may have condemned Islam for allowing these traditions, those who follow a strict interpretation of the Quran continue to adhere to these practices. Even in this country, we see from time to time reports of honor killings by Muslim men who felt that their daughters or wives have brought disgrace to their family name.

Justice Louis Dembitz Brandeis, the namesake of Brandeis University, was the first Jewish justice appointed to the Supreme Court, and, according to Justice William O. Douglas, was known for being a "militant crusader for human rights". The shame is that Brandeis University does not seem to follow the convictions of their namesake.

PRAYER

We often think that the "problem of prayer" is a unique phenomenon. Given our tendency to idealize the religious lives of our ancestors, we might benefit from the observation that prayer was as complicated and difficult an issue for them as it is for us.

Indeed, the Talmud's first volume deals in depth with prayer. While our typical rabbinic take-away from that text focuses on the technical issues of prayer (exactly what we should say, under what circumstances, and with what frame of mind), lurking in the background is the rabbis' acknowledgement that, even in antiquity, what prayer was and how it operates was mysterious and complicated.

The great religious revival movement of the Ba'al Shem Tov and his disciplines, which reinvigorated Jewish life in Eastern Europe, attempted to resolve some of these religious dilemmas. Hasidic literature is full of discussions about prayer, how to approach it, what it means. The different Hasidic rebbes and courts that emerged stressed different aspects of both Hasidut in general and prayer in specific. For some, prayer was a form of personal psychological self-evaluation; for others, a mystical exercise to connect with The One; for yet others, a nearly "magical" cabalistic experiment in tikkun olam, rectification of the shattering that allowed for the universe to come into existence.

But in all events, prayer for the Hasidim of the 17th and 18th centuries was apparently as problematic and difficult then as it might be for us now. Thus an early collection of Chassidic sayings (Liqqutim Yeqarim) offered, in Arthur Green and Barry Holtz' translation, the following advice concerning prayer:

One who read the words of prayer with great devotion may come to see the light within the letters, even though one does not understand the meaning of the words one speaks. Such prayer has great power; Mistakes in reading are of no importance.

A father has a young child whom he greatly loves. Even though the child has hardly learned to speak his father takes pleasure in listening to his words.

(From <u>Your Word Is Fire: The Hasidic Masters on Contemplative</u> <u>Prayer</u>)

As we approach Shavout, which, while not our paradigmatic holiday, is truly the Jewish religious raison d'être, may The One who is, in our liturgy, Our Father, be as this father, attentive with pleasure to the words we can barely properly pronounce.
