CONFLICT IN THE MIDDLE EAST

The best way to understand the Middle East conflict is by going back to the basics. While the solution to the ongoing impasse is complex, and maybe out of reach for the foreseeable future, the underlying cause of the conflict is simple. Here are four (4) basic points that will help you gain a fuller perspective.

1) Israel was not created because of the Holocaust. If the Holocaust never occurred, the Jewish nation state would still have been created. Remember, Theodore Herzl, the organizer of modern Zionism, died in 1904. That was 10 years before WWI, long before the Holocaust. A.D. Gordon, who was Eastern Europe's equivalent to Herzl, died in 1922. The first Zionist Congress was established in 1897. By the late 19th century, it was clear, the political workings for the reestablishment of a Jewish homeland, while both nascent and extremely fragile, were well under way.

2) After the Romans destroyed/conquered Jerusalem in the 1st century, there were a number of different groups that ruled the region in brief succession. From 1301 until approximately the end of WWI, the Ottomans controlled Israel. Palestine fell under British rule beginning after WWI until Israel's formation in 1948. The Romans named Israel Palestine; conquering armies often renamed their spoils. Palestine is not an Arabic term. Note: after the destruction of Jerusalem, no other foreign nation declared Jerusalem its capital. No other

nation ruled its empire from within Israel. The land was largely left vacant, though numbers of Jews always lived there. In 1917, the United Kingdom's foreign secretary, Arthur James Balfour, confirmed support of the British government to reestablish Israel as a homeland for the Jews.

3) Question: What do you do when you have two national entities, the Jews and the Palestinians, vying for the same piece of land? The most sensible thing is to divide it. That was proposed by the United Nations. It was accepted by the Jews and rejected by the Palestinians. It's that simple. The partition plan of 1947 drew its lines around populations reflective of Arab and Jewish enclaves.

HIGH HOLY DAY MEMORIES OF MY FATHER

Whenever the High Holy Days roll around, they invariably bring back memories of my father. He was a jack-of-all-trades when it came to the Jewish religion: rabbi, cantor, Torah reader, Hebrew teacher, mashgiach, shochet - you name it, he did it. He had a congregation in a little town in western Pennsylvania: Jeannette, PA. It had a population of only about 16,000 people, but a surprisingly large number of Jews. It was large enough to hire a

rabbi and to raise the funds to buy and renovate a building to make it into a shul.

Most of my memories of the holidays from that period of time are hazy, since we moved back to Orange, NJ, when I was 10. Most of the time, I played outside the shul with the other Jewish kids, but we would all run in to listen to my father blow the shofar. The shofar blasts had some mystical feeling for me. One year, my father formed a small choir to support him for the holidays: my brother Hy, Mr. Sam Bloom, my friend Mile Bleiberg, and me. We practiced all summer for the holidays, and I think we did fairly well. I still remember some of the melodies today.

My strongest memories are from the time we moved back to Orange (where I was born). My father decided to give up his pulpit and went to work as a full-time shochet in a chicken market in Orange. He supplemented his salary by hiring himself out as a cantor and Torah reader for the High Holy Days for some of the local congregations in northern New Jersey that didn't have full-time clergy. Since his eyesight was very poor and I was the youngest, I was selected to accompany my father on these trips. Even though I made new friends in these towns, I sat in shul for the entire service. There are two prayers that made the greatest impression on me: Hineni and Unetaneh Tokef. I can still see him walking slowly toward the bimah chanting the Hineni, wearing his white kittel and high white yarmulke. He was from the old school of cantors (they had that characteristic kvetch in their voice as they dovened), and when he reached the words "nirash v'nifchad" (overcome by awe and trembling), it was impossible not to feel the solemnity of the moment and the seriousness he felt for his role, pleading for forgiveness for the congregation. His Unetaneh Tokef was equally as moving. These two prayers are burned indelibly into my memory, as are my memories of my father.

PRAYER & MUSIC ROPE & HARNESS –

The Jewish New Year is upon us once again, the time of year where we gather as a community and pray, looking inwards individually and as a community. What is prayer? Why do we pray? How is it enhanced by music?

I recently had the opportunity to visit Camp Ramah in Ojai California, where I spent the day walking around and meeting Jewish kids as they had a great

time together in a fun Jewish environment. Even though there were over 600 kids on the grounds, I managed to bump into a few of our KM kids who were really enjoying themselves. Amongst the multitude of great activities is this unique, large, and extremely high ropes course. When I arrived at the rope course there was already an Adah (bunk) on the course on the first level, 100 feet off the ground. I asked if I could join the kids and the counselor said sure, so I did. I was put into a harness and climbed to the first level, where I joined the Adah and jumped from platform to platform to wire walkway while holding hands before making it to safety.

Back on the ground with our feet firmly planted, the rope course instructors (who happened to be Israelis) sat us all down under a tent to debrief the shared experience to see if, aside from the great fun, we could learn any life lessons from the climb. The teenagers were about 14 or 15 and here are some of the things that they shared:

1) We need team work for all of us to complete the course

2) I had to conquer my fear

3) Staying calm in precarious moments helps to complete the mission

One child said "I prayed- I even said the Sh'ma".

We made many more observations and it got me thinking how I, as a cantor, can relate to this ropes course and what messages I could learn from it (including all the great observations the teens made, of course).

There is a famous Hassidic lesson about the connection we, as Jewish people, have with God and how it is comparable to a rope. On one end, there is God holding on to the top of the rope and, on the other end, we are dangling in our harnesses. On the High Holy Days, our lives hang before God and we use prayer to strengthen our connection with Him in the same way the child prayed and said the Sh'ma when she was afraid on the ropes course. Communicating with God through prayer reminds Him that we are on the other end of the rope while reassuring us that we are in good hands. It reassures us that God is supporting us and will continue to do so throughout the coming year. Music is like our harness, the conduit that keeps us safe and secure. The melodies have been passed down from generation

to generation, L'dor V'dor. As a community and as individuals we sing our prayers to confirm and strengthen that bond we have with our Father in heaven.

May this coming year be a year of:

- 1) team work
- 2) conquering our fears
- 3) calm and peace
- 4) answered prayers.

May it also be full of joy, health, and happiness and "harnessed" in with music.

When the United Nations declared Israel a free and united Jewish homeland on May 14th, 1948, Israel's Arab neighbors immediately attacked her. At the time, there were no Palestinian refugees; there was no West Bank or Gaza Strip. There was only unadulterated hatred foisted upon the newly born Jewish homeland. The hatred for the Jew in the region preceded Israel's creation and it has continued ever since.

4) A historical perspective: In 1967 Jordan attacked Israel in an all-out war. Israel prevailed and, in the course of its own self-defense, acquired the West Bank and all of Jerusalem. Had the war not occurred, there would be no Palestinian refugee issue to the extent that it has continued to exist up until today. But understand further, in years 2000 and 2008, Israel had offered to return nearly all of the West Bank to the Palestinians in exchange for peace. Israel's overture for peace was rejected both times.

In future editions of the Voice, I will touch on other basic issues as they relate to the BDS movement, Egypt, Gaza, Iran, Jordan, Syria, the West Bank, and Zionism, along with my own feelings on the Jewish settlers' movement.

Until then, let's pray for Israel as she struggles to reign in Hamas and other evil groups who wish to destroy her. Let's pray for the protection of innocent people living on both sides of the border. Let's pray for Israel's goodness, vitality and importance in a world that is immeasurably enriched by her existence. Above all: Let's pray for peace.

our prayers and blessings will be part of our holy arsenal, in defense of a liberal, democratic, Jewish state. From R. Jonathan Sack's Siddur:

"May He who blessed our fathers, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, bless the State of Israel, its leaders and advisors in the land which He swore unto our fathers to give us. Put into their hearts the love and fear of You to uphold it with justice and righteousness, and may we be worthy in our days to witness the fulfillment of the words of Your servants, the prophets: "For out of Zion shall go forth the Law and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem". Heavenly Father: Remember the Israel Defense Forces, guardians of our Holy Land. Protect them from all distress and anguish, and send blessings and success to all the work of their hands. Grant peace in Your Holy Land and everlasting happiness to all its inhabitants, so that Jacob shall again have peace and tranquility, with none to make him afraid. Spread the tabernacle of Your peace over all the dwellers on earth. May this be Your will, and let us say, Amen."
