THE MEASURE OF A LIFE

RABBI MICHAEL GOTLIEB

By what standards will our lives be measured? No doubt, a tough question. The Talmud (Shabbat 31a) lists six questions God will ask us; four of which I care to focus on briefly below.

The first: Nassata v'nattata b'emunah? Were you honest in business? (Literally, did you deal in good faith?) You don't have to be a corporate executive to answer that question. Every time you intentionally fill out your tax return improperly or inflate an insurance claim, that query is relevant. Every time you misrepresent yourself and manipulate, lie, or cheat, the question applies.

Second: Asakta b'priyah v'rivyah? Did you work at having a family? The Talmud fully acknowledges not everyone has,

can have, or chooses to have children (let alone get married). A more inclusive read of the question would be: did you work at *being a family—a Jewish family*? Our Jewish family needs your help, particularly now. Intermarriage, assimilation, and indifference plague the Jewish family. The aggregate number of Jews is down and that downward trend is being felt worldwide. Judaism, unfortunately, is not a "growth industry."

Third: *Kavatah eitim la Torah?* Did you make time for Torah [in your life]? Regardless of one's religious orientation, Torah is the bedrock upon which Judaism is defined. It is the foundation for all that is Jewish.

Fourth: *Tzipita La yeshua*? Did you hope for (anticipate) redemption? Or, as I would



apply the question, were you optimistic? An inherent optimism comes from living a God-filled life. Living such a life infuses a higher, ultimate purpose to our existence. Does your life reflect that God-filled element; do you at least grapple with the notion?

As the Jewish New Year is upon us, and with it the hope of another year of life, these ethical measurements, these questions are more pressing; they become ever more personal. I suspect, in the final analysis, the standard by which all of us will be measured is whether the world is a qualitatively better place as a result of our having been born—may that be so. In the meantime, and beyond, I hope all of you are blessed with a year of goodness, health, and meaning. *Shana Tova*.



PERSPECTIVES ON SECURITY

I recently attended a security workshop at the American Jewish University (AJU). A number of incidents in the past few months have sparked a variety of different workshops and seminars on the topic; for example, the rise of ISIS, the beheading of James Foley, and attacks on Jews in predominantly Jewish neighborhoods in New York and Los Angeles. All things considered, there is concern in the Jewish community about the prospect

of terrorism, especially around the High Holidays. Accordingly, a number of these workshops and seminars were sponsored by Jewish organizations. At this workshop, there were presentations made by a number of groups: the district attorney's office, law enforcement and crime prevention, the Anti-Defamation League (ADL), and the Los Angeles Jewish Federation.

Elan Carr, Deputy District Attorney in Los Angeles, candidate to represent the 33rd district in California in the US House of Representatives, and a major in the US Army reserves, led off. (Carr is also the son of our own Carmella Pardo). Carr served a tour of duty in Iraq, leading a counter-terrorism team and interrogated a large number of terrorists. He had some interesting perspectives on the differences between interrogating common criminals and terrorists. Terrorists are great at saying nothing. He stated that there was no intelligence indicating an imminent threat from Islamist terrorists for the upcoming High Holiday services, but that there was a very real threat from a shooter acting alone or in concert with another. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) agents have indicated to Carr that there have been a significant number of terrorists caught and deported but that there are still number remaining in the US. These operatives have a great deal of patience and will often take years to meticulously plan and execute terror attacks. Al Qaeda waited eight years after the first attack on the World Trade Center before 9/11, and it was very meticulously planned. They are probably in the process of planning some horrendous attack, but it's not expected for this High Holiday season. And my guess is that Kehillat Ma'arav would not be a likely target – not now or in the future. Terrorists like high profile targets, and that is not us.

The rest of the program dealt with steps that can be taken before, during, and after a shooter attack. Personnel from the LAPD, Sherriff's Department, and private security firms participated in this session. They provided much advice on how to make our facility more secure. This was followed by a presentation by the ADL on anti-Semitic incidents in the Los Angeles area, including actions to take when such acts are spotted. Finally, there was a presentation by the Jewish Federation on the assistance they can provide to improve the security of Jewish facilities. They do a cost-free walkthrough which identifies vulnerabilities and steps that can be taken to improve safety, and we plan on having the Federation come in and do a walkthrough here at Kehillat Ma'arav.

TIMELESS MUSIC

The year ends and begins again, but it does not truly come to a final stop as it starts up again right away. The musical term for this is a false cadence. The song feels like it ended, but then continues. Aside from Rosh Hashana, the Jewish New Year, the Jewish equivalent of this false cadence is the holiday of Simchat Torah. It is the holiday where we finish the Torah reading cycle and restart it immediately

thereafter. In addition to this musical parallel, Simchat Torah is also celebrated with dance, song, and music.

An interesting way of looking at the history of music is through the lens of false cadences. Each style of music comes to an end, from the inception of music, to the baroque style, followed by the classical period, all the way through today, creating an everlasting false cadence. Music has always been an expression of its time, yet some music, such as Mozart, Beethoven, and the more contemporary Beatles, have withstood this test of time.

The following quote about the Beatles is by a well-noted music critic. The Rabbi mentioned the quote during our recent "Shabbat in 3D" to illustrate how we should not be so critical, yet it also proves how music is a reflection of its time, and how, on the rare occasion, one can create music that is timeless.

"The Beatles are not merely awful; I would consider it sacrilegious to say anything less than that they are god awful. They are so unbelievably horribly, so appallingly unmusical, so dogmatically insensitive to the magic of the art that they qualify as crowned heads of anti-music, even as the imposter popes went down in history as "anti-popes."

William F. Buckley Jr. could not have been more wrong, and history has proven that. However, was he simply expressing how he felt at the time, so how was he to know that the Beatles would become the biggest thing since sliced bread? He *couldn't* know and I would venture to say he might not have even been able to envision the possibility of the music's future impact because he was used to hearing the music of his own time. The Beatles did not make music of the time because their legend was achieved by creating music that is timeless.

Jewish music, like the music Cantors sing today in synagogues around the world in every denomination and like everything else in Judaism, is always evolving. This is one of the reasons that the "Guys and Maidels" group of which I am a part is so exciting and fun; everyone in the group is constantly looking for innovative music to continue the false cadence of the past and, if we are fortunate enough, to create some timeless music along the way.

There is, however, one Cantorial piece of music that is both of its time and timeless. All attempts to remove it from services throughout history have consistently failed. I am, of course, referring to the Kol Nidrei. It has been sung and rearranged in every way possible; even non-Jews have recorded it, most notably the recording by Perry Como and the magnificent Max Bruch's composition for cello. The Kol Nidrei melody is haunting, stirring, and inspirational. It reaches a place in the soul that is beyond the dimensions of time. *Shana Tovah*.

One of my favorite things at KM is our once-a-month Kabbalat Shabbat Services. We brought back the Friday night services about five years ago with the help of long-time member Sherrill Kushner. Our services are quite musical, always with congregational singing, and originally with limited piano accompaniment as well. It's been a bonus to enjoy the KM Choir as their music enhances services many times throughout the year. Last August, we stepped it up and introduced tambourines and the KM Band. Due to the popularity of the percussion instruments, we doubled our supply to accommodate the crowd. Our best attendance is when we have a catered dinner following services, however, at services this past year we've had 50-75 congregants lured only by snacks and coffee! Many congregants then go out to dinner together following services and schmoozing.

Ushering in Shabbat on Friday night at KM is a spiritual party. Many people arrive early, filling the atrium with ruach as we greet each other and, as this continues, we move into the sanctuary. Cantor Cohen's enthusiasm sets the tone for a lively experience and Rabbi Gotlieb shares a timely D'var Torah and helps to lead the service. There is a special community moment when Rabbi takes out five minutes to encourage congregants to extend a hand of welcome to those they don't know. We are so grateful to the KM Band and the Choir for their dedication to enhancing our services with their music. Before these services, we now have PJ Library, a pre-school program brought to us by the Jewish Federation and led by Masha Savitz, Director of Early Education and Arts Programs at KM (see page 5 for pictures from September's PJ Library). Some of these families also stay to enjoy our services.

On September 5th, we welcomed over 100 people for services and dinner at our Annual Membership Kabbalat Shabbat Service. There was an added energy that night as 30% of the congregation consited of prospective members. The dinner, catered by Balabusta, was delicious and the evening was complete with prospective members sharing stories. RELFECTIONS ON JOY

Hermann Cohen deserves to be much better known today. He might be the most important Jewish philosopher of the 19th century. A leader of the Neo-Kantian School, he taught in Marburg at the College for the Science of Judaism in Berlin until 1912 and thereafter until his death in 1918. Martin Buber and Franz Rosenzweig can be counted among his students, although they had reservations about his framing of Judaism as "ethical monotheism," as expounded in his Jewish magnum opus, "The Religion of Reason: Out of the Sources of Judaism."

Cohen's reflections on Sukkot and Simhat Torah:

....(J)oy in the festival--which joy is its very meaning and foundation--is also a symbol of peace. If it is true that holidays make joy a reality among men, the road to peace becomes a road to life. It is no illusion that they holidays are festivals of joy. The joy that is realized in the holiday of freedom, of deliverance from slavery and of the divine call to become a kingdom of priests, is no deceptive joy. It is a truly historical joy that celebrates the revelation on Mount Sinai, the legislation of a moral

world. And it is also true joy which links the Festival of Harvest with the wanderings through the wilderness, concluding with the Rejoicing in the Law as a whole.

Joy is a well-established rubric for these holidays. Joy in the holidays proves peace a fundamental force of the soul and an important road to virtue...

Peace in the joy of the festival is characteristic of Jewish life. It is a miracle that, in spite of all the sufferings which have marked his history, the Jew has been able to preserve such equanimity, even humor, without which he could not have managed to rise out of the deepest humiliation to such proud heights. This miracle is due to the festivals. On the Sabbath as on the holidays, there was joy in the ghetto, no matter what sufferings the week had brought. Joy in the festival was a religious duty, and became an unshakable and vital force to Jewish consciousness.
